

Count Your Buttons Day October 21st

Dalton Stevens was known for covering objects with buttons, beginning with clothing and shoes, and eventually his guitar, a hearse, and two caskets. His hobby, initiated due to insomnia, propelled him to national notoriety as the "Button King." In 2008 he opened the Button King Museum in a metal airport hangar constructed by his children, next to his home in Bishopville, South Carolina.



Even his end-of-life preparation reflected his passion. Actually, two caskets were each covered in 600,000 buttons, one for his own burial and the other for display in the museum.



At the age of 86, in 2016 he was buried in his button suit and button-ensheathed casket.
